



The garden expands the native demonstration gardens Grow Wild established at Historic Crail Ranch in 2019. Located on Big Sky Community Organization property, Crail Gardens have become a gathering place where residents and visitors experience the beauty and diversity of native mountain plants.

The new Firewise Crevice Garden will surround the historic Michener Cabin, a homestead-era log structure relocated to Crail Ranch from the Ophir School area. As a historic wooden building in a high wildfire-risk landscape, the cabin provides an ideal setting to demonstrate firewise landscaping and home hardening principles.

Inspired by the dry alpine slopes and rocky ridgelines of southwest Montana, the garden features resilient native plants that reflect the character of this landscape throughout the seasons.

In spring, bitterroot and biscuitroot emerge among the stone. Summer brings penstemons, phlox, buckwheat, and silverleaf phacelia buzzing with native bees and butterflies. Kinnikinnick, stonecrop, sagebrush, blue grama grass, and jungrass provide year-round texture, while yucca and goldenrod add late-season color and structure.
